Tour 2: Lower Powers Creek Restoration Tour: Blue Lake Rancheria

Coordinators: Jacob Pounds and Michelle Fuller will lead a tour of Lower Powers Creek on Blue Lake Rancheria. Powers Creek is a tributary to the Baduwa't (Mad River), where an undersized bridge acted as a complete fish passage barrier and cut off access to important habitat for salmonids for many years. The Tribe was able to remove the barrier and improve habitat through a collaboration with several community partners and multiple funding sources.
